

THE ARCTIC WOLVES

These beautiful Arctic wolves were born in captivity at Parc Safari, near Quebec in Canada, during a fierce snowstorm. They would not have survived but for the quick intervention and expertise of the park staff who hand-raised them.





They had no space to keep them so we were very happy to give them a permanent home.

They arrived at the Trust in June 2011 and quickly settled

into their large enclosure. They were the first Arctic wolves to live in the UK and their calm affectionate temperaments and soft thick white fur make them very popular with visitors. They have a low, melodic howl and are very photogenic.

We have named each of the cubs from the Labradoran Inuit language: Sikko (female, pronounced 'see-ko') meaning ice, Pukak (male) meaning fine snow and Massak (male) meaning soft snow.
